## SOUR CREAM WALNUT CAKE

*One of Phyllis Moore's Favourite Recipes*

Method: Sift together: 2 cups of sifted flour, 3 tsp. baking flour; 1-2 tsp. soda; 1-2 tsp. salt. Blend together: 3 tbsps. soft butter or margarine, 1 1-8 cups (1 cup plus 2 tablespoons) sugar, creaming well.

Add: 1 1-2 cups sour cream. Mix well. Blend in 2 eggs and 1-4 teaspoon Black Walnut flavoring. Beat for 1 minute. Add dry ingredients; blend, then beat for 1 1-2 minutes, low speed. Pour into well-greased and lightly floured 12 x 8 x 2-inch pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 deg. F.) 40 to 50 minutes. Cool and frost.

## SPEEDY CARAMEL - NUT FROSTING

Melt 1-4 cup butter or margarine in saucpan. Add 1-2 cup firmly packed brown sugar; cook over medium heat for 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Add 1-4 cup light cream; continue stirring and bring to boil. Remove from heat; blend in 1 1-4 cups sifted confectioner's sugar and 1-3 cup nuts, chopped. Mix well. Add 1-2 teaspoon vanilla. If necessary thin with cream, a few drops at a time.
