Mrs. Bell's Favourite Recipe

ANGEL FOOD CAKE

Measure and sift 3 times:

1 cup sifted softasilk Flour

7/8 cup sugar

Measure in large mixing bowl.

1 1/2 cup egg whites

1 1/2 tsp. Cream Tartar

1/4 tsp. salt

1 1/2 tsp. Vanilla and 1/2 tsp. Almond Essence.

Beat until foamy then add 3/4 white sugar, 2 tblsp. at a time. Continue beating until Meringue holds stiff peaks.

Fold dry mixture gradually over egg whites and push batter into ungreased tube tin.

Temperature 375. Quick moderate oven — 30 to 35 minutes.
