## Films Provide Entertainment

## Mrs. Bell's Favourite Recipe

### BANANA MUFFINS

1 egg  
½ cup sugar  
¼ cup butter or margarine  
1 cup bananas (mashed)  
1½ cups pastry flour  
½ teaspoon Baking Powder  
¾ teaspoon soda  
Pinch of salt  
Walnuts  
Vanilla  
½ cup milk or cream.

Cream butter and sugar, add egg and other ingredients, milk and bananas should be added last. If batter is too thick add more milk or cream.
